

### **Cliff Todd and Kimberton Hills**

Sometimes we experience "coincidences' that are so touching, we stand in awe. That happened when Cliff Todd came to visit Kimberton Hills years ago with his dear friend Betsy Church, mother of Ross and long- time volunteer and supporter of our community. He recognized something that touched his heart—and without fanfare, gave us a large matching grant. We met Cliff as a Kentucky gentleman and knew a bit of his background—the way he and Betsy re-met after many years...But Cliff connected his life with ours after that brief visit, in extraordinary ways.

We were later to learn of his biography, partly through the book, Corn Bread Mafia—written about a particularly poor Kentucky county Cliff became associated with. We also learned that Cliff came from a poor family, that he had a twin sister Catherine who had various disabilities, and that Cliff had used the payments from his first job to buy her a hearing aid. Gradually other aspects of his life were shared. A few years ago, he offered a large leadership grant toward the Sankanac CSA building, which we have named the Catherine and Cliff Todd Sankanac CSA Building in his honor. Along with his gift, the Camphill Foundation, The Logan Initiative Fund and many years work of our garden teams made the building possible.
